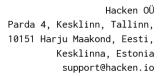




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Introduction

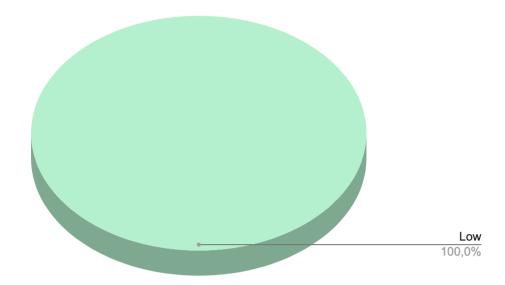
Our team performed an analysis of code functionality, manual audit, and automated checks with Mythril and Slither. All issues found during automated analysis were manually reviewed, and important vulnerabilities are presented in the Audit overview section. All found issues can be found in the Audit overview section.

As a result of the audit, security engineers found 3 low severity issues.

After the second review security engineers found that the code was slightly changed, upgradable features were added to the assets, owner function to remove assets was added to the Pool contract, and some issues were addressed. Therefore 1 low severity issue was found.

Severity Definitions

Risk Level	Description		
Critical	Critical vulnerabilities are usually straightforward to exploit and can lead to assets loss or data manipulations.		
High	High-level vulnerabilities are difficult to exploit; however, they also have a significant impact on smart contract execution, e.g., public access to crucial functions		
Medium	Medium-level vulnerabilities are important to fix; however, they can't lead to assets loss or data manipulations.		
Low	Low-level vulnerabilities are mostly related to outdated, unused, etc. code snippets that can't have a significant impact on execution

1. No event on changing valuable addresses

When contact changes some valuable address it is strongly recommended to emit an event so the changes could be tracked off-chain.

2. No event on changing valuable arithmetic values

When contact changes some values which are taking place in arithmetic calculations it is strongly recommended to emit an event so the changes could be tracked off-chain.

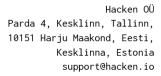

Recommendation: Please emit events on changing valuable addresses in contracts.

3. Calls inside a loop





Calls inside a loop might lead to a denial-of-service attack.

If one of the destinations has a fallback function that reverts, the top-caller function will always revert.

Contracts: pool/Pool.sol

Functions: getEquilibriumCoverageRatio

Recommendation: Try to find math/storage solution instead of calls inside the loop. For example, you may want to store asset decimals in the mapping and not call to its function "decimals()".



Conclusion

Smart contracts within the scope were manually reviewed and analyzed with static analysis tools.

The audit report contains all found security vulnerabilities and other issues in the reviewed code.

As a result of the audit, security engineers found 3 low severity issues.

After the second review security engineers found that the code was slightly changed, upgradable features were added to the assets, owner function to remove assets was added to the Pool contract, and some issues were addressed. Therefore 1 low severity issue was found.
